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### Pierre Dixneuf: A Pioneering Career in Organometallic Chemistry Highlighting Ruthenium as a Star Metal in Homogeneous Catalysis

With this virtual issue, Organometallics celebrates the career of Professor Pierre H. Dixneuf. Pierre is an internationally renowned chemist who has devoted his scientific life to organometallic chemistry and catalysis with ruthenium as a favorite transition metal. Before introducing the content of this issue, it is appropriate to dedicate a few lines to describe Pierre's career.

#### PIERRE DIXNEUF'S FIRST CAREER

Pierre H. Dixneuf was born in Coron, a village located on the Loire valley's west side. Because of its mild climate and peaceful countryside, this area was selected by the kings of France to establish their wonderful castles during the Renaissance period. It is also a place where it feels good to live with good food and pleasant wines, which Pierre considers the best province in France.

Very early, a very enthusiastic and enthralling primary school teacher triggered his passion for sciences. After his first years at the University of Brest and Rennes, he undertook doctorate studies on ferrocene chemistry under the supervision of Prof. René Dabard, a former student of Prof. Jean Tirouflet, both of


them pioneers of organometallic chemistry in France. After obtaining his doctorate in sciences in 1971, he spent a post-doctoral period (1971-72) in the laboratory of Prof. Michael F. Lappert in Brighton (UK) working on pioneering transition metal carbene complexes generated in the presence of electron-rich olefins. Then he began his academic career at the University of Rennes where he got a Professor of Chemistry position in 1978 and was subsequently promoted 1<sup>st</sup> class in 1988 and exceptional class in 1994.

#### FROM ORGANOMETALLIC CHEMISTRY: RUTHENIUM AS A STAR


He initially developed his laboratory in the field of organometallic and coordination chemistry and rapidly oriented his research on topics dedicated to *Organometallics and Catalysis* in the 1980s. At that period, he intensively developed the domain of stoichiometric activation of terminal alkynes at ruthenium centers, essentially from RuCl<sub>2</sub>(arene)(phosphine) and RuCl<sub>2</sub>(dppe)<sub>2</sub> precursors, and provided a huge innovative contribution to the field of ruthenium-alkoxycarbenes, -vinylidenes, -allenylidenes and higher –cumulenes (Scheme 1)<sup>1-3</sup>


At the same time, he looked at the possibility of applying these new unsaturated organometallic species in catalysis. This constant exchange of ideas between stoichiometry and catalysis in the same research team led to the discovery of the *anti*-Markovnikov addition of *O*-nucleophiles to terminal alkynes and the proposal for the first time of the involvement of a rutheniumvinylidene in a catalytic cycle.<sup>4-5</sup> This period corresponded to the development of catalytic reactions from terminal alkynes, more precisely the synthesis of vinylcarbamates directly from carbon dioxide and amines, (Scheme 2) and the preparation of the two regioisomers of enol esters depending on the nature of the ruthenium catalyst.

At the same period, the preparation of cyclic carbonates from carbon dioxide and propargylic substrates catalyzed by a phosphine, and their reactivity in the presence of palladium catalysts contributed to the development of the topic on carbon dioxide valorization.

Catalytic transformations of alkynes and alkenes with the electron-rich RuClCp\*(cod) complex provided unprecedented coupling reactions *via* oxidative coupling of alkynes at the metal center (Scheme 3).<sup>6-7</sup>




**Scheme 3** – Activation of alkynes *via* oxidative coupling of CC and C=C bonds.

#### FROM ORGANOMETALLIC CHEMISTRY OF ALLENYLIDENE RUTHENIUM TO METATHESIS CATALYSIS

At the end of the 1990s, when well-defined ruthenium carbene complexes were developing as efficient olefin metathesis catalysts, cationic ruthenium allenylidene complexes were also introduced in catalysis for the first time as efficient olefin metathesis catalysts in Pierre's team.<sup>8</sup>. Mechanistic studies revealed that the ruthenium allenylidene entity was transformed into a metathesis active ruthenium indenylidene species under catalytic conditions, which provided an entry to stoichiometric preparation of this type of complexes, another example of back and forth movement between stoichiometry and catalysis (Scheme 4).<sup>9</sup>




Scheme 4 – New allenylidene to indenylidene arene ruthenium catalysts for metathesis reactions

Later on, in the same vain, transformations of natural products such as fatty acid derivatives, terpenes and phenylpropenoids *via* cross-metathesis were exploited towards industrial targets.<sup>10</sup>

#### **RUTHENIUM AND C-H ACTIVATION**

At the dawn of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, due to seminal results obtained with various transition metal catalysts, the interest of researchers for C-H bond activation/functionalization all around the world increased considerably. With his expertise in ruthenium catalysis, the future impact of ruthenium catalysis in this field was obvious to Pierre Dixneuf. He developed this topic using mainly [RuCl<sub>2</sub>(*p*-cymene)]<sub>2</sub> as catalyst precursor in a strategy of directed *ortho*-functionalization of arenes in water. In collaboration with Dr. Anny Jutand he evidenced an autocatalytic process during the C-H bond activation in the catalytic arylation of arenes (Scheme 5).<sup>11</sup> He applied such methodology to prepared a trisbenzoquinoline motif, representing a Triskell, one of the famous Celtic symbol in Brittany.<sup>12-13</sup>

Very recently, he turned his attention to photoredox catalysis and wrote a review article on this topic.<sup>14</sup>

# HIS ENERGY DEDICATED TO NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Besides his prolific research activities, which have led to about 500 publications, including 25 review articles, 21 book chapters, and 7 edited books, Pierre has been strongly involved in the national and local administration of research. He spent 3 years as vice scientific director at CNRS (The National Centre for Scientific Research) in Paris from September 1996 to December 1999 and 3 years as vice-President for Research at the University of Rennes from 2001 to 2004. He played an important role in the creation of the Institute of Chemistry at the University of Rennes, gathering in the same Institute most of the local chemists and became the first director.

In recognition of his many contributions, Pierre Dixneuf has been a member of the Institut Universitaire de France since 2000, and has received numerous awards, including national prizes from the French Chemical Society, the Le Bel Prize (2000), from the Academy of Sciences, de la Charlonie Prize (1994) and IFP Grand Prix (2006), and international awards, the A. von Humboldt Foundation Prize (Germany 1990), Grignard-Wittig Award of the GDCh (Germany 2001). The Sacconi medal (Italy 2006), Catalan Award of the Spanish Chemistry Society (Spain 2014), Prize of the Chinese Chemical Society (China 2014), the Asima Chatterjee Award (India, 2020). He has been elected member of The European Academy of Sciences (2014), the Academy of Sciences of Portugal (2017), and the National Academy of Science, India (2020) and has been honored as Honoris Causa Doctor of the University of Waterloo (Canada) and Honorary professor in foreign universities (China: Anhui Normal - 2006; Jinan - 2017; Nanjing Tech. -2018; Taiwan: Tsinghua - 2009).

Following the motto "no one is a prophet in his own country", Pierre initiated many collaborations with chemists all around the world either with invited professor positions in Rennes, participation in European Research networks, the creation of an Erasmus student exchange network, and organization of international workshops.
